## Everyone's a winner

Once again there is controversy surrounding the elections for St Ives Town Council and Huntingdon District Council. This time it is the absence of Town Council candidates resulting in all of those standing being elected.

Four years ago the controversy was about the adopting of the 'Independent For St Ives' title by most of the Tory candidates in an attempt to bamboozle the public at the ballot box.

This time there are no official conservative candidates standing for the Town Council, which was clearly unexpected and has resulted in only 14 candidates for 17 places.

This is the first time in living memory that there will be no elections for the entire Town Council as all 14 candidates will be automatically elected on 5th May.

### Tories abandon Town

Following public criticism of Conservative District Councillors for not attending last month's Town meeting, it would appear that St Ives Tories have decided to abandon the Town Council altogether.

With no official Tory candidates for the Town Council, another first in St Ives, it is unlikely that this situation came about by chance.

One current District and Town Councillor, Craig Smith, did stand for the Town Council but did not declare himself as a Conservative. This is not unprecedented but it begs the question - Was it official party policy not to take part in the elections? If it was - is Craig in trouble?

### More questions ...

The Town Council is already having a difficult time with the Town Clerk still ill and her deputy having just retired. The loss of nine experienced Town Councillors is unprecedented.

Those not seeking re-election include former Mayor and Planning Committee Chairman, Nick Dibben, former Mayors Jonathan Pallant, Dan Rowe and Tim Drye. The other five not seeking re-election are Angela Dickinson, John Parkin, who was coopted last April, Dr Carla Pegoraro, elected four years ago, Rianna D'Souza a current District councillor and Ryan Fuller, the current Leader of Huntingdonshire District Council and a County Councillor, first elected to the Town Council in 2008.

*The Riverporter* has spoken to several experienced local politicians about why the Tories have left the Town Council en masse and one view was that the Tories were only interested in paid positions.

One prominent Conservative was reported to have said that the Town Council often disagreed with the District Council - the conclusion being that they didn't want to work with a difficult Town Council.

This comment is very worrying because most residents would assume that both authorities should work together for the benefit of St Ives. This attitude would appear to explain why the Town Council has not been kept informed about HDC's plans for some time (see RP106). And why items such as the 'Parklet' appearing without appropriate consultation or warning.

### District will be contested

The District Council seats for St Ives will be contested and for once it could be a very close call. The Conservatives did put forward five candidates for the five seats available and they will be compete against 6 other candidates. In **St Ives East (2 seats)** two Independent candidates, Michael Burke, who organised last year's popular Christmas Lights and Shariqa Mokbul, a dedicated Town Councillor will stand against the current Tory District Councillors, Adam Roberts and Craig Smith.

In **St Ives South (2 seats)** Labour's Cath Gleadow and Lib Dem's Nick Wells, a current Town Councillor, will stand against Tory candidates Martin Gill and Rianna D'Souza, a current Town and District Councillor.

In **St Ives West (1 seat)** The Green Party's Daniel Laycock and Independent candidate Julie Kerr, who is a Town Councillor and founder of the Flood Action Group, will compete with Ryan Fuller for the one seat available.

*The Riverporter* will be offering to print in full and unaltered an election address from each candidate in our next issue so you can decide who to vote for on 5 May.



## COUNCIL NEWS

### Combined Authority may push ahead with St Ives and A141 upgrade

Following updates on the progress of the St Ives Local Improvements Study and the A141 and St Ives Outline Business Case(OBC), the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) will ask officers to prepare a grant funding agreement with Cambs County Council.

The plan is for the A141 and St Ives Local Improvement schemes to run concurrently to make sure there is co-ordination between the two projects, offering the best solutions possible while at the same time moving forward 'Local Improvement' solutions specific to St Ives.

There are five 'packages' of schemes planned.

**Package 1 – St Ives Town Centre** Introduction of a 20mph speed limit across St Ives Town Centre. Changing priorities and road widening at the Ramsey Road/North Rd, Globe Place/Broad Leas and West Street/East Street junctions. Changes to on-street parking restrictions in the town centre area, to reduce illegal parking and reducing congestion, rat running and improving bus access.

**Package 2 – Silvaco West Roundabout Improvement** Silvaco West roundabout improvements, replacement of the roundabout at the St Audrey Lane/Somersham Road junction with traffic signals. A right-turn ban for all traffic from Needingworth Road onto St Audrey Lane.

**Package 3 – Bus Stop Improvements** Improvements to bus stop infrastructure, including: 22 priority bus stops; Removal of redundant bus stop infrastructure; and on-priority bus stops and hail and ride. To make travel by public bus services in St Ives a more attractive option by improving the bus stop infrastructure facilities.

**Package 4 – Walking and Cycling Signage Improvements** Package of walking and cycling signage improvements to encourage increased levels of walking and cycling.

**Package 5 – Non-Motorised User NMU Routes Development Study** Development of a network of active travel routes in and around St Ives that can be considered for investment.

### Someone is missing on our High Street

We don't know anything of her past, but she was certainly part of the town and noticeable by her absence. We understand she passed away at home of a heart attack.



### Group fighting medical waste incinerator seeks royal support

Campaigners opposing plans for a medical waste incinerator at Woodhurst have written to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales about their environmental concerns.

The Prince previously visited the site to see ground breaking work in producing peat and soil substitutes. The facility's current owner, Envar Composting Ltd, now wants to build an additional hospital waste incinerator on the site.

Local resident and member of the POWI campaign group, Lorna Watkins, said: 'We feel the Prince would be shocked to hear that this rural site could now morph from a green waste recycling business into a waste burning operation on an industrial scale. The incinerator would in effect be burning fossil fuel in the form of single use plastics mixed up in the waste, so it can hardly be described as organic waste processing or clean, green energy. In fact the project can best be described as a wolf in sheep's clothing,' she added.

The POWI group represents over 3,500 residents opposing Envar's application, which is open to comments until April 19 and will be decided by Cambridgeshire County Council's planning committee in the summer.

### Man who assaulted 4 women in St Ives jailed

Ionut Bleoju first put his arm around a 17-year-old girl who was walking her dog in Warners Park at about 2pm on 13 January. He pulled out £40 and said 'you, me, hotel?' before lunging towards her and kissing her on the face.



The 40-year-old went on to attempt to block another woman from leaving the park around the same time and in East Street at about 2.40pm he grabbed a woman around the waist in an alleyway. Then at 5.30pm he approached a woman who was sitting in her vehicle with children in Market Hill. He opened the door and tried to get in the car. The victim got out and Bleoju put his arms around her waist before offering her and her husband £80 when he arrived. All the incidents were reported to police and descriptions of the suspect given. The next morning Bleoju was arrested. At Cambridge Magistrates' Court on Thursday 31 March, Bleoju, of no fixed address, was sentenced to 26 weeks in custody after pleading guilty. He has been given a restraining order and put on the Sex Offenders' Register for seven years.
