Town Clerk Leaves Council

St Ives Town Council have issued the following statement regarding the Town Clerk, Alison Benfield.

It is with regret that St Ives Town Council have to announce that our long serving Town Clerk Alison Benfield has left her position at the Town Council.

Mrs Benfield has been on long-term sick leave and it was our hope that she would recover and be able to return to her role. Sadly, it has now been established that her health is such, that this is no longer possible. Full Council held on the 28th September 2022 formally agreed to release her from the duty of Clerk based on health reasons with immediate effect. We would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the years of commitment and service Alison has given to our town; her strength, knowledge and vast experience will be greatly missed. We wish her well in her early retirement.

This statement allows the Council to appoint a new Town Clerk, something that has caused difficulties for the Council, which *The Riverporter* has commented on in the past (see RP 113). It is hoped that the Locum Clerk, Matthew Price will be able to take on this important role.

Town Council change venue

Just after the last issue of *The Riverporter* went online, St Ives Town Council changed the venue for its meeting on the Draft Masterplan for St Ives.

Following some criticism that the original venue, a room in the Corn Exchange, would restrict attendance, the Town Council has moved the meeting to the **Hall at St Ivo Academy**, which will hold up to 300 people.

The meeting will be held on Wednesday 5 October 2022 at 7.00 pm.

The Plan for St Ives can be seen at: <https://www.huntingdonshire.gov.uk/masterplans>. It is difficult to read on-line but the Town Team has produced a large printed copy, which can be read in the Riverport Café Bar.

Anyone who wishes to attend and comment should note that:

Residents or representatives of neighbourhood groups can speak for a maximum of 3 minutes. The meeting will have a strict 2 hour duration. Comments should be sent in advance to: democratic@stivestowncouncil.gov.uk and will be summarised as part of the Council's submission which will be returned to HDC by 26 October 2022. Residents are also able to comment directly to HDC on their website.

The Riverporter understands from councillors that these plans are meant to stimulate discussion, rather than being seen as definite planning proposals.

In the jargon it is 'Blue Sky' thinking. Whilst this may be the case that is not the way these plans were presented, particularly as they are the result of an earlier consultation and report called a 'Prospectus For Growth' (PFG) and this second stage, we were informed, would be the working up of the ideas put forward in that.

We know from a Freedom of Information request that £50,000 was the cost of the PFG and one may assume that the bill for the Draft Plan will be of a similar amount.

Therefore it is possible that £100,000 may have been spent on giving us a starter for ten!

If you care about your town and how it will be over the next 30 years then you should attend this meeting. **NOTE:** As the Town Council has now organised a meeting for the whole town, The Town Team has decided to cancel its Draft Plan meeting of the 18 October.

Whatever Next?

When we started *The Riverporter* in 2018 we weren't sure if we would have enough local news to fill the paper each fortnight. We needn't have worried. The past five years have been extraordinary. Even more unexpected was that national and international news would have such an effect on our lives in St Ives. Dear Milly, Subject: Draft Town Plan

In order to be able to judge the validity of the claims made in the draft St Ives masterplan, it is important that the data behind them are freely available. They are not. Several readers are struggling to get access to the reports referred to in the Masterplan and its companion baseline report. It is understood that the consultants are reluctant to produce one of the reports for scrutiny. Where cost-benefit models are cited as the basis for the economic viability of the project, it seems odd that the models, their values and how they supposedly work, are all unavailable. If there was ever a time for the new HDC regime to show that it is different from the last one, now is that time. We have a sneaking feeling that although the Councillors' names may have changed, HDC still thinks it is business as usual. Providing the data and reports to the public is the chance to show this is a new slate. By dragging its feet, HDC is not encouraging optimism and belief in change that the new Council claimed in May.

- Concerns about additional noise and refuse
- Combining a listed building with a former warehouse property is incongruous
- Unclear on access arrangements, deliveries etc.
- That noise measurement was conducted at a time when the venue was not busy with customers sitting outside.


