



## Plans are progressing well for the Coronation Big Lunch

The Town Council with members of the Town Team and FEST have been working to provide a feast fit for a King on Sunday May 7th, the day designated throughout the country as the day for a Coronation Big Lunch.

The team are providing enough tables and seating for more than 300 people to come and have their Coronation Big Lunch, or in this case, the **St Ives Coronation Big Picnic**. As well as tables and seats there will be some food stalls, various activities and games and of course some entertainment.

Just bring your food and enjoy the day with your fellow residents on what will be an historic weekend.

**Music, poetry and games**  
The musical entertainment will include the brilliant keyboard player Mark Burton with the wonderful crossover classical music singer, Karen England, who rose to fame as part of the Opera Babes.

Mark can play just about anything and their performance will no-doubt include music from Santana to Elgar and from Saturday Night Fever to Land of Hope & Glory.

Mark and Karen will play from 2pm. Other musical acts are still to be confirmed, however also confirmed is the attendance of St Ives own 'Poet

Laureate', Chris Morgan and friends who will be sprinkling the day with poems and readings.

### An early start

The Coronation Big Picnic will start at midday but for those of you who wish to start a little earlier The Courtyard, just a few yards away, will be open from 10am.

They will be hosting Chip Pauly 'The Global Busker' on their out-door stage from 12-2pm.

The Courtyard will also have Coronation themed Arts and crafts, available for all ages from 11-3pm and their very own pastry chef will be baking fruit scones, to eat in or take away, served with cream or butter and jam.

### A Coronation Mug for every primary school child

As a momento of the coronation the team have designed and ordered a special St Ives mug. Featuring the official King Charles logo the mug will be unique to St Ives.

The Mayor Phil Pope has decided to hand out the free mugs, personally

to each one of the 1,286 primary school children in the town.

This will be quite a task as the mugs will be distributed via the schools the week after the Easter holidays. As you can see in the picture below the logo will appear on both sides of the mug, so that you can see the logo whether you are left or right handed.

### Mugs on sale

There will also be a chance for you to buy this limited edition mug. The price has yet to be set but is likely to be around £8 to £10.

They will be on sale at the Coronation Big Lunch on a first come first served basis.




## Great news as funding is secured

This week the Town Team has been awarded a grant of £15,000 from Cambridge & Peterborough Combined Authority for the Bandstand, which is to be erected on The Waits. This brings the total raised to around £55,000 and will ensure the Town Team have enough funding to finish the project.

Nearly all the money pledged by residents has been collected and also good news is that the refurbishment of the bandstand is now in full swing and we hope to have a date when it will be available to be transported to St Ives soon.

It will take some time to do the installation and then we will be adding the names of everyone who has contributed to the project, either with a donation or by giving their services for free, which will make the bandstand unique to St Ives and a lasting memorial to the generosity of its people and its appreciation of Queen Elizabeth II, who it will be dedicated to.



## The Great British Spring Clean

The great British Spring Clean - 17th March - 2nd April 2023 is upon us, as hundreds of people across Huntingdonshire prepare to take to our streets and green spaces, armed with litter pickers, gloves and bags, to remove as much litter as possible.

The first Great British Spring Clean was introduced back in 1989 with founders, Keep Britain Tidy, enlisting the assistance of children entertainers, The Wombles, alongside an estimated 2 million volunteers across the Country, to litter pick within and around their local area. With such a success, it was only suiting to continue this year upon year, not only to help in the clearance of litter but to raise awareness of the disastrous effects it has.

**2023 marks a prominent year for our waste team, with new litter picking groups forming all over our district, bringing like minded individuals together to tackle a common problem.**

Litter remains a serious issue across Huntingdonshire, not only looking unsightly, but having a dramatic effect on our local wildlife and the environment that surrounds. The Huntingdonshire District Council, continue to spend valuable time and resources to

eradicate litter, utilising their street cleaning team, although in many cases it returns as quickly as it's collected.

Huntingdonshire District Council recently commission a road clearance exercise, along the verges of the B1043 commonly known as the old A1. Thus far, a staggering 308 bags of litter have been collected over a period of 4 days, equating to an estimated 3 tonne of rubbish; a key indicator that littering is a distinct problem, with still more of that stretch to cover.

Littering is a national problem, not just localised to Huntingdonshire, and without the help of volunteer groups picking at their leisure, it would be mounting up on a scale that is uncontrollable. We therefore appeal to you to ensure that you as an individual, do your utmost to dispose of waste in a correct manner, utilising bins provided within your surroundings or alternatively taken home.

The Great British Spring Clean takes place between 17th March to 2nd April, with group picks arranged across Huntingdonshire throughout this period. On 27th October it is another welcome return of **Lexie Green** who will be accompanied by the ever brilliant Johnny 'Magic Boy' Wright.



**Subject: Station Road car trap**

Mr R Pearson who complains about the car trap (letter RP130) should count himself lucky that the police did not prosecute his wife for driving without due care and attention. Generally they feel that the inattentive driver has most probably suffered enough financially. However they have done so at times.

By both sides of the left hand lane are signs indicating no entry except for guided buses.



In addition, following a nasty accident involving a cyclist our chairman lobbied for further measures to reduce the accidents involving the car trap created by County Council Highways.

As a result the last twenty metres of the road are coloured red and the words 'GUIDED BUSES ONLY' are written TWICE on this surface.



There is also white emblem indicating to cyclists that they must use the TOUCAN crossing.

However we have had another idea that might also help. Close to the exit from the car park we hope to be able to add a sign along the lines of the French 'Toutes Direction' signs.

Hopefully that will tell strangers who want to return home to turn RIGHT into Station Rd. That will cost a lot less than the £8k needed for an APN camera.

He was born in Inverness and is proud of his Scottish heritage. He spent most of his schooling in the Huntingdon area before embarking his adult life further afield.



**James Cantwell** works in the education sector and is involved across the county in football. James has a passion for open practice in education and widening participation in sports, and has been involved in a County Football Association's Inclusion Advisory Group since 2022. Unfortunately the circa quarter of a million pounds to resolve the issue is not helping! Also I'd appreciate if your paper spelt my name right.'*

We apologised for misspelling Mr Setchell's name and are happy to direct anyone with queries on flooding to go to the **St Ives Action Support Team Facebook page** as requested.

The other comment was from Councillor Craig Smith who wrote:

*'I don't see why you felt the need to single me out in your article on the annual town meeting. All reports were scripted, I wasn't the only one with a laptop/iPad, and I wasn't the only one who was asked to slow down. I don't disagree that my public speaking needs more practice. I am working on it, but comments like this are unhelpful! I spoke to quite a few people after the meeting and they all understood me just fine. If you needed a copy of my report, I would have happily sent you one. Maybe then you could have reported something useful about the property committee instead of cheap digs! Give your heads a wobble!'*




