YMCA to close this month

According to staff at the YMCA the business has been given four weeks notice to leave the premises on the Sheepmarket, meaning the shop will close on Saturday 12th August.

Because the YMCA must be out of the building by Sunday 20th of August, according to the landlord, the shop will close a week before to allow all the stock to be moved. As a result, eight members of staff have been made redundant, including the Manager Monica Mallol Wright and her assistant manager Rae Smith.

The YMCA have told *The Riverporter* that they wish to open another shop in the town centre and would reinstate the current staff. However there are no suitable premises available at an affordable price. The YMCA say that those premises that are of sufficient size have very high rents, so at present there is little likelihood of the store staying in the town centre.

The store was opened last February and, as we reported, the then Deputy Mayor, Councillor Nic Wells (pictured above) was on hand to welcome Monica and her team.

In the eight months that the store has been open it has been popular and one of the best performing stores of the 100 YMCA branches across England.

We understand that the YMCA would have liked to stay but they could not compete with the rent that the new tenant, Loungers, offered.

Loungers is a national café, bar and



restaurant chain which already has local branches in Huntingdon, St Neots and Peterborough.

We understand that the new St Ives Lounger will be opening on the 21st December and the company is currently advertising for staff to work at the IVO.

Loungers was founded in Bristol in 2002 by three friends who wanted to create a neighbourhood café-bar that they would want to go to. That focus on hospitality, comfort

and familiarity remains at the core of the Company, driven by an independent culture and focus on the local community.

Their website says ... *At Loungers, we are passionate about how we become engaged and embedded within our local communities.*

Well it will be interesting to see just how engaged they become. There are two distinct brands, 'Lounge' and 'Cosy Club'. Lounge is described as a neighbourhood café/bar. Cosy Club is a more formal bar/restaurant offering relaxed dining with a touch of timeless glamour.

EcoAction works towards Sustainable Fashion

The drop in garment prices over the last 20 years has allowed us to buy more and more clothes. We now have 5 times more clothes than our grandparents had. This felt great until we found out what was hiding behind this trend.

In reality, this continuous accumulation of cheap garments is only possible because of a constant reduction of production costs. This, in turn, has serious consequences on our health, our planet, and on garment workers' lives.

Climate Café

On 15th July 2023 St Ives EcoAction held a Climate Café at St Ives Methodist Church to explore the subject of Sustainable Fashion.

Those gathered explored what the issues are, what the concept of sustainable fashion might mean for us personally.

What we might do collectively as a town to tackle reducing carbon emissions in relation to what we wear, where we source our clothes from, and what we do with them when they're worn out.

The fashion industry is thought to contribute to between 5-10% of global greenhouse gas emissions, one of the largest polluting sectors of the planet after the oil industry, aviation and transportation.

At the Café, people chatted over coffee, tackling questions such as: What is my oldest garment? Have I clothes which I never wear but hold onto 'just in case'? Are my clothes

biodegradable?

A 'Transform Trade' quiz revealed startling facts about water used to make cotton, the number of people working in the garment industry, and how we dispose of unwanted clothes. Fill at Forty, one of our local refill businesses brought their pop-up shop to the Café to raise awareness of their service.

The group came to the conclusion that if we work together, we can tackle this issue bit by bit. Maybe by starting with a couple of things people in our town and surrounding parishes can do. The discussion will continue at the next Climate Café at St Ives Methodist Church on Saturday 9th September, 10am to 12 noon where the group will develop ideas and take practical action. All are welcome.

Raise the Roof Party raises much needed funds

The Corn Exchange team are busy putting their plans in place to try and mitigate the impact of the work of roof repairs due to start this Monday when the Riverport café will operate from the downstairs bars. The highly successful Friday evening music lounge events will go ahead as planned and the events team ask all our regular supporters to keep an eye on our web site and newsletter.

It's proving a very tough year for the Corn Exchange, as it faces a perfect storm of unexpected, extraordinary high costs and forced partial closures due to the repair works. However, one bright spot came last Saturday with the 'All Day Raise the Roof Party'.

The event helped raise funds and awareness. Ever since the building was saved in 2010 it has been a true community hub. Following the Covid pandemic the Corn Exchange has also emerged as a lively centre for music, art and community support as well as providing the town's most comfortable coffee shop.

During Covid there was some financial support but that is no longer available so the disruption caused by the works is causing a severe financial strain on the centre. Saturday's event saw a number of musicians and comedians and all the Corn Exchange staff and directors give up their time completely free to entertain visitors from 11am to midnight.

Chairman Rob Jackson said 'It was great fun and wonderful to have such community support, but we need to do much more through the rest of this year. We will be continuing our raffle through August, and we would be very grateful for any donations, and anyone interested can find us on our Facebook Just Giving page.'

The evening was attended by Mayor Phil Pope who praised the work of the Corn Exchange for its support for the community. The final sum raised won't be known until later this month. The evening was finished by the 'X Rated' band that left the crowd smiling. Earlier musicians included Paul (Pianoman) Dodson, The Tomb raiders and Poke and others, including Phil Christie. Phil (above) is a regular at the highly successful open mic nights every month.



OTHER NEWS

Huntingdonshire District Council confirmed the appointment of their new Chief Executive. Michelle Sacks, from South and East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership, has worked in local government for 27 years and started her career at Fenland DC. She will take over from the council's Corporate Director of People, Oliver Morley, who took on the position on an interim basis following the departure of Jo Lancaster. 
Meanwhile refuse workers, customer services ass. and planners at HDC have voted to strike, saying that the 4% offer would leave them struggling to make ends meet.

Local churches win a double silver environmental award

Revd Dr Catherine Ball said, 'As a church we have worked hard towards reducing our carbon footprint, and raising awareness of the fragility of our planet, God's creation.'

The curtain goes up on the 2023/24 Southern League season for St Ives Town on Saturday when they host Mickleover at the Quattro-Tech Westwood Road.

The Ives flirted with relegation in the final weeks of last season but finished in 16th position, 11 points clear of the drop zone.

Ives manager Ricky Marheineke has kept the nucleus of his side with key defender and supporter's player of the year, Jordan Williams signing again for another season. He is joined by other key players such as Jonny Herd, Michael Richens and leading goalscorer from last season, Jonny Edwards. Much will depend on the prolific striker as the Ives will look to him to repeat his scoring exploits from last season.

Marheineke has made some new signings with striker Brandon Njuko and midfielder Dan Barton joining on loan from Cambridge United. At the weekend, goalkeeper Eddie Brearey also joined on loan from Oxford United and the defensive options



have been bolstered with

Aaron Smith arriving from St Neots. Also joining are winger Tiago Nassunculo, from Barwell and Fernando Bell-Toxtle, from Royston to strengthen the midfield options.

Interest in the club is certainly on the up with attendances increasing during the second half of the last campaign, and the club has also sold a record number of season tickets ahead of the big kick-off. So, with excitement mounting for the start of a new season, make sure you get down to the Quattro-Tech Westwood Road on Saturday and cheer the Ives on to a winning start. Kick-off is at 3:00pm.

Dear Erik,

Parish Hall to be converted into flats?

Echoes of the Corn Exchange?

I have registered an Objection to HDC Planning Application 23/01212/FUL/Proposal: Conversion of existing church parish hall into residential units at The Church Hall, Ramsey Road, St Ives.

Comments are needed by Huntingdonshire District Council by 7th August.

I am pleased that some of my objections are very similar to the views of St Ives Town Council.

I believe that this application should be refused and the applicants should be urged to engage in fund-raising and grant applications to raise the £150,000 needed to restore this historic building as a flourishing church hall and community asset.

At no point have the congregation of All Saints' and the wider community of St Ives been consulted whether they are willing to lose their much-valued Parish Hall.

There is no vision or understanding on the part of the applicants for the potential of the substantial size Parish Hall in these changing times of greater social need, for example for a continuing Food Bank there, a non-church community meeting place or as a 'warm space'. By its own admission All Saints' has shown neglect for its Parish Hall for the past thirty years and now wants to dispose of it, without committing any effort to save and restore it. Numerous people within and outside the congregation believe that the considerable neglect of the past ten years has been deliberate and that the real intention is to secure change-of-use and then demolish the building. Demolition was the purpose of the original planning application.

Contrary to the shocking assertions of the applicants, since 1869 the Parish Hall has had a rich history and has had the closest ties with All Saints' Church. Protection and renovation of the Parish Hall ticks the boxes of all of the elements of the Heritage Strategy of Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC), as contained in its Local Plan to 2036.

Breaking News

Cambs Police have confirmed that at 2pm on Wednesday 2nd August they were called to a boat moored at Noble's Field in St Ives, where the body of a woman was found there. Several emergency vehicles attended and the field was cordoned off.

Town Council refuse church's application

St Ives Town Council's Planning Committee has recommended refusal of the Parish Church's plans to convert the existing church parish hall into residential units. The Committee grounds for refusal lists the lack of consultation with the local community, and lack of evidence that sufficient efforts were put into finding alternative funding sources. Committee members expressed their conflicted nature on this application; they understand the church's need to raise funds to maintain their primary building but were concerned about the loss of a community resource. As the Church is a Grade 1 listed building, members stated there are many funding streams available for maintaining historical buildings. Public consultation on the future of the parish hall would be encouraged by the committee.



Better news about the railings

County Councillor, Kevin Reynolds has been busy chivvying up the County Council's Bridges and Structures team to get the railings on The Waits repaired in time for the official opening of the bandstand on 10th September. The railings should be delivered on 5th September and installation is due to take place the following day, 6th September. Fingers crossed then!
