Dolphin to return to its prestigious position?

According to reports in the media The Dolphin is one of the hotels that the Government will no longer be using for asylum accommodation. St Ives County Councillor, Kevin Reynolds, said he was hopeful it will return to its previous prestigious position and condition.

Cllr Reynolds told *The Riverporter* 'Cambridgeshire County Council and HDC had no say or input into the allocation of migrants to the Dolphin, it was just imposed upon us with no consultation.'

He also said 'I am pleased to say that discreet lobbying seems to have worked, as the Dolphin is a very important part of our local tourist economy, and I am hopeful it will return to its previous prestigious position/condition.'

An email from the Home Office's Tim Rymer to the CCC said:

'I am therefore pleased to inform you that the Home Office is now terminating the contract with The Dolphin Hotel, as asylum accommodation and it will cease being used by the end of November 2023, reflecting the contractual notice period on this property.'

Residents currently accommodated in the hotel will be moving to other parts of our asylum estate. They will

be notified a minimum of 5 days in advance and moved by the Home Office in line with our existing published policies. Whilst we expect impacts on local authorities to be minimal, we are putting in place additional resource to work with our accommodation providers and local partners to manage this process and minimise disruption, particularly focusing on families.'

The Riverporter wonders just what will happen to the hotel now?

Below is a picture of the terrace,



before the current owners took over. It was an important venue for the town with 67 rooms, a large restaurant, a gym and was a popular wedding/party venue.

Since its acquisition in 2017 there have been numerous 'incidents' with poor reviews by users. It seemed the asylum contract may have been a welcome deal for the owners, who recently gave £3,000 towards the St Ives Christmas Lights.

But will it now become the prestigious venue it once was?

St Ives Town into round 2 of FA Trophy

Following an assured display, St Ives Town had a magical 3-1 victory over Marine AFC. In the second round they have been drawn away to Aveley who are currently second in the National League South, six points behind leaders Yeovil having lost four of their opening 14 league games this season. The tie will be played at the Parkside Stadium on Saturday 18 November.

Cambridgeshire's brand new 'ghost town'

Britain's biggest new town, built for 26,000 people, is so empty locals have parties in the road. Northstowe still has no shops, cafes or GPS six years after the first families moved in. Around 1,200 homes have been built since construction work started in 2017. Around 10,000 homes are planned, which will make it the biggest new town in England since Milton Keynes, Bucks, was built in 1967. However frustrated residents have hit out at the developers saying Northstowe has been left like a 'ghost town' without promised facilities.



Ivo teachers to strike

Teachers at a Cambridgeshire school are set to strike on November 1, 2, 7, 8, and 9 over working conditions. Members of the NASUWT teachers' union describe the school's behaviour policies as 'heavy-handed' and claim that they do not allow teachers to manage behaviour fairly or proportionately.



Cuts to services could be coming



The Chief Executive of Cambridgeshire County Council has said he believed savings and cuts to services will need to be made to bridge the £23million funding hole. The Council has said its estimated funding gap for next year has increased by around £7.3million due to rising costs and increased demand for its services.

In February this year when the county council set its budget, the authority estimated it would be facing a £16.3million budget gap in 2024/25. However, the authority has said the 'financial outlook has worsened' over the last eight months.

Will sign stop cars turning left?

It would appear that the County Council have put extra signs up on the exit to the cattle market car park on station road as shown right. Hopefully it might stop drivers turning left and heading towards the car trap.



Confusion over NP and Vision documents

The first few comments are coming in on the Neighbourhood Plan (NP) and people are getting confused between the HDC Vision Document and the Neighbourhood Plan. There have been several comments saying 'I don't like the pontoon in the river' although this is not mentioned in the NP at all. The HDC Vision Document is a set of ideas, rather than specific proposals, that is being used to obtain Government or local funding.

The Neighbourhood Plan does not include specific proposals but tries to define the local context such as the architectural style, key views and linked spaces. Once accepted the NP will contain statements that any future ideas for the town centre will have to comply with.

If people are still confused, then the Neighbourhood Plan team will be at the Farmers Market on Saturday 18th November to answer any questions.

Labour on termination of 2 asylum hotels

Cambridgeshire Labour have issued the following statement about the Government's intention to stop using 100 asylum seeker hotels 'in key battleground seats' which the press said was a bid by the Prime Minister to improve Conservatives general election prospects in those areas.

'The reality is asylum seekers have been waiting for much longer than the 6 months the Home Office aims for their applications. The asylum backlog is in the tens of thousands and has been as high as 170,000. Asylum seekers want to learn English, work, integrate and have a normal life in the UK like everyone else. The Home Office seems to be more concerned with gimmicks like the costly and unsuccessful Rwanda plan rather than pragmatic policies of hiring more caseworkers and speeding up claims, while tackling criminal gangs exploiting asylum seekers.'

Latest: There could be another empty shop in town as His & Hers Footwear, in Bridge Street is closing and moving to Rushden according to a notice in their window.
