

What is going on at the Park & Ride?

Since the scheme to put solar panels above the park and ride car spaces was first given planning permission by the County Council (CCC) way back in 2017, the project seems to have inched forward, and has now come to a grinding halt.

Looking through the shuttering surrounding the site in mid-July, weeds are growing nicely.

Although users of the rest of the site, and busway passengers, may not be impressed by the blank metal wall, we are assured that there is progress. The March 2022 announcement said that the project would take just about a year. Two years on, and we are still waiting. In *Riverporter* 152 in February 2024, we noted that delays were apparently due to transformer issues and connections to the national grid.

The £5.6 million project, has been part funded by what was the former 'Levelling Up' department, using EU Regional Development Fund money. What is the to-be-completed site meant to provide? CCC says:

- 1MW solar photovoltaic system – equivalent of 250 average domestic solar installations
- 237kW of battery storage
- 10 x 22kW electric vehicle chargers
- Private wire to a local business to supply them with renewable energy
- 27GWh of clean energy forecast to be generated over 30 years

- 5.5GWh of clean energy forecast to be supplied to electric vehicles over 30 years – equivalent to 18-22 million miles
- Saving 15,025 tonnes of carbon emissions over 30 years, contributing to Cambridgeshire's goal of Net Zero by 2045.

In April 2024, an updated press release provided an opaque assurance:

The microgrid infrastructure has been installed on the Park & Ride site. Our contractor, Equans, is currently undertaking comprehensive final checks to assure the quality and safety of the installation, prior to returning the area to public use.

Our contractors have told us:

Quality assurance has been performed throughout the design and installation of the Microgrid project and continues to be a key priority at this time. We are working as quickly as possible to complete this exercise. It is, however, possible that some remedial work may be necessary and, should such a scenario arise, it is likely that the



works will be undertaken prior to return to public use. This is to avoid any future need to close the site. We expect to be in a position to provide clarity on the timescales for reopening the site shortly. We recognise the impact the reduced area for parking is causing to users of the Park & Ride service. Rest assured, our focus is on safely returning the site as quickly as possible, to bring this ground-breaking project into full operation for the community's benefit.'

So that's alright then?

Although Equans proudly trumpets the car park as a successful project on its website, there is no mention there of a completion date for 2024. Until there is, weeds will continue to grow nicely behind the sheeting, and we'll miss the chance to use all of the summer sunlight for generating much-needed green energy.



[?letters?] As a footnote however, we in SIIb do support and congratulate the unknown grounds maintenance team who are alert to the presence of Bee Orchids (*Ophrys apifera*) and even a Pyramidal Orchid (*Anacamptis pyramidalis*) on an area of grassland within the town (see right).
