Environment Agency meeting, St Ives Corn Exchange, Monday 12th August

## Uproar from the outset!

The Environment Agency's (EA) public meeting held in the Corn Exchange last Monday failed to pacify residents, boaters and councillors as EA officials bluntly refused to acknowledge the questions and concerns of those attending.

The Environment Agency offered a public event at the Corn Exchange in response to complaints from residents over flooding issues, and from boaters unhappy about restricted navigation. The EA wanted to explain the current situation with the Brownhill and St Ives locks sluice gates. But there was concern from the start, as the meeting was being held in a room which was too small with inadequate seating and no microphone. From the moment that EA's Area Director, Sadia Moeed and Area Flood and Coastal Risk Manager, Philippa Hulme spoke there was uproar. They insisted the meeting would follow their presentation script, bluntly refusing to acknowledge the questions and concerns of the large turnout of interested parties. This included County Councillor, Kevin Reynolds, District Councillor, Julie Kerr and St Neots Councillor Stephen Ferguson. The EA refused access to some of their team who were present, arguing that direct questions would put them on the spot. A quite extraordinary approach that outraged many of the attendees even before the meeting had started, as of course being put on the spot was exactly what the room wanted.

The EA argued that cost/benefit analysis of the effect of reduced flood water discharge due to sluice gate failures did not warrant expensive repairs. They argued that available budgets were not sufficient for maintenance in any case and many of the audience could be seen angrily disagreeing in the loud and disorganised melee that ensued.

Boaters too were forcefully arguing that the failure of Brownhill Lock at Earth for many weeks this year had denied them access to and from St Ives preventing boats coming to our town, therefore denying St Ives tourist income. Riverboat trips from The Quay were not possible in April due to high water levels and to add insult to injury the EA is currently proposing another 9 per cent increase in boat licence fees.

### EA behaving like Canute?

Now there is no denying this is a



complicated issue, mainly due to the conditions and lack of funding imposed on the EA by government. However the EA's **'No can do'** attitude doesn't help.

Like Canute a 1,000 years ago ... are they hoping that will power will be enough to prevent flooding?

John Hesp, a chartered water engineer, whose professional career was spent working for the EA or its predecessors in East Anglia was able to comment. Speaking on behalf of several parish councils, the Swavesey, Over and Bluntisham Internal Drainage Boards, local farmers and Enderby's Wharf directors, he made important points. Lack of space doesn't allow us to put these points in full so we list the issues that the EA need to deal with.

- It is contested that the St Ives and Brownhill staunches are only there for navigation purposes. River level management is required to meet all the environmental needs, water supply, flood risk management and navigation needs
- It was a condition of the GIA Flood Alleviation Scheme 2006/7(FAS) that all river control structures should be maintained throughout its lifetime
- The General Drainage Charge paid by land owners, of £943k in 23/24, should be used for maintenance of control structures
- The fact that only 3 of the 7 gates at St Ives Stauch and 1 of 3 gates at Brownhill are working has contributed to this year's flooding getting to within 3 inches of breaching the defences.

- EA has used different criteria from that used for the 2006/7 FAS scheme and their current data is unreliable and underestimates flood risk
- There are alternative sources of funding, such as a local levy that can cover projects up to £3m

The *Riverporter* has spoken with several people concerned with these matters and there has been a general consensus that the EA is short of funds and the way it operates is not fit for purpose. Key to this is the *Regional Flood and Coastal Committee* (RFCC) designed in 2010 to bring together local flood authorities and the EA to mitigate flood risk and ensure money spent represents value for money and benefits local communities.

### Decisions made in ignorance?

The RFCC is the body that decides which projects are funded and they agreed not to fund the St Ives repairs based on the evidence submitted by the EA.

As the EA were the only group able to speak at the meeting, councillors attending were only able to hear one view of the matter and a flood report submitted by St Ives was not heard. The committee were told by the EA that the repairs to St Ives and Brownhill were not urgent and didn't need funding allocated to it.

The EA said at Monday's meeting they had sought £70,000 of funding for St Ives but only received £7,000, which by any standard was a very poor result and begs the question if the funding application was good enough.

## EA respond to the meeting at St Ives Corn Exchange. Continued from Page 1.

### A spokesperson for the EA told The Reporter:

'Following incredibly wet weather over the last year, we understand that communities in the St Ives area are concerned about the St Ives Stauch and Brownhill Stauch sluices. Both sluices contain internal gates which are in a poor condition. These are currently closed to help ensure that levels remain high enough for water users to navigate through whilst reducing flood risk as much as possible for the community. 'We held a meeting on Monday to provide an opportunity for members of the public to talk to us, ask any questions they may have and gain a better understanding of the situation. We wanted to make sure as many people as possible were able to ask questions to our colleagues. We felt that

the best way was to make sure there was time for all attendees to have one on one time with EA staff to ask questions.'

'As shared at the event, the EA are actively trying to secure funding to repair the structure and continue to inspect the structures in the meantime to ensure they are safe.'

'We have also launched a website through which we will keep members of the public up to date.'

**Asked why the St Ives fund bid for £70K resulted in such a low offer of just £7k, the EA said:**

'Our annual maintenance programme includes a range of activities that are prioritised and timetabled using information from inspections, maintenance standards, levels of flood

risk and from legal and statutory obligations.'

'EA teams bid for funding each year to carry out maintenance activities across our assets and river systems.'

'The EA will generally not receive the full amount of funding that is applied for.'

'At the event we shared the example that last year, the EA bid for around £70,000 of DEFRA Grant in-aid for maintenance activities in St Ives specifically but received around £7,000. However, with the funding available, which includes an amount from other local funding streams, we continue to undertake routine maintenance works. This includes weed and grass control, safety and structural operational checks, as well as general site inspections and maintenance in the area.'

## Civic Sunday Parade and Service



### Regarding the recent civil disorder

Some of us were deeply shocked by the violence committed by so many 'ordinary' citizens and young people in particular. Over 1,000 people have been arrested so far with 372, adults charged, plus 65 under 18 including two 12 year olds. (80% under 40 years old). Prison sentences are being handed out. The longest so far being 3 years and 4 months (by comparison some stop oil protesters have been jailed for over 4 years for non-violent protests).

Will their parents will be held responsible?

It would seem that parents are not held directly responsible although Parenting Orders could see parents attend counselling sessions.

#### Heartening response from the majority

The other side of this story is the magnificent response by the 'silent majority' that helped quell the riots. Anti-racism protesters turned out to protect immigration centres, mosques and hotels housing immigrants from anti-immigration protesters and far right extremists.

Is this an opportunity for unity?

Whilst the Police have been under verbal attack recently, most law abiding citizens were shocked by the physical violence against officers trying to keep the peace.

Perhaps the combined force of the non-violent anti-racism protesters working with the Police could see some trust return for the Police.

### FoRSIT - St Ives Regeneration Forum

Spearheaded by the Civic Society's Chairman, Christine Phillipotts, a number of community groups, councillors and individuals have come together to discuss how St Ives Town Centre might be improved and regenerated. It is hoped that the Forum will create a regeneration plan for St Ives for the next 10 years raising its profile and boosting the town's economy.

The Forum ultimately intend to consider the whole town centre over the coming months. 
