Out with the old and in with the new?

A phrase that is often used at this time of year and yet we start with the news about two of our older and most respected local citizens, who are definitely now in!

Ed 'the Poppy Man' Kelly, now 101 years old has been named in The King's New Year Honours List 'for over 40 years of selfless voluntary service' to the Royal British Legion.



Ed told the BBC 'being appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) took me rather by surprise'. He added he was 'just one of a team' of other volunteers. Since 2009, the branch has raised more than £400,000 for the Poppy Appeal and he was awarded the Legion's Centenary Award to reflect his outstanding contribution. It also recognised him on its Centenary Wall of Honour.

Mr Kelly has also been given St Ives Town Council's Lifetime Achievement Award because of his regular presentations to schools, cadets and other youth organisations.

He said: 'I do talks about why you should wear a poppy and wear it with pride and say the heroes are the ones on the memorial. I'm one of the lucky ones who survived.'

Mr Kelly added he hoped to continue supporting the annual Poppy Appeal for as long as he is fit.

'I'm living up to my reputation as the Poppy Man,' he said.

Other local people honoured included 82 year old David Chambers. The ex-Head of Art at St Ivo, who retired 23 years ago, was awarded a British Empire Medal for services to music and to the community in Somersham. When the news broke on a local Facebook page about his award the comments, mostly from past pupils were effusive. 434 people liked the post and over 70 posted comments, some still calling him Sir and



referring to his nickname 'Chunky'.

New plans labelled Grim Towers

A planning application by Gladman Retirement Living Ltd., to build 86 retirement flats next to Meadow Lane overlooking St Ives Sailing Club lake has already received several objections.

According to the submission, the 86 one, two and three bedroom apartments aim to provide a safe, comfortable and supportive environment for its elderly residents, ensuring their independence and well-being.

Objections included the impact of the 'wind shadow' on the sailing club, the use of greenfield land rather than brownfield. One objector said that 'Although the location would provide residents with a nice view, it comes at the cost of everyone else who has to look upon these grim towers – instead of the little remaining woodland this country has to offer.'

Town Council grants £38k to community

At the full council meeting in December, the following grants were awarded for the 2025-26 year and will be paid in April 2025.

The grants will help these community groups to provide the services and events that St Ives enjoys, including the wonderful floral displays by St Ives In Bloom, Picnic in the Park, The Old Riverport Jazz & Blues Festival and this years 600 year celebrations of our famous bridge.

Bridge Lights update

Issue 174 of *The Riverporter* highlighted the dangerous state of the lights on the Bridge, following some vandalism. Although the Bridge is the responsibility of the County Council we now know that the lights are the responsibility of the Town Council. The Town Clerk has told us that the electrical supply has been turned off so the fixings are safe and that they are seeking replacements. They were custom made, so not straight forward and it could be some time before replacements are fitted, hopefully before the summer and the 600 celebrations.

700,000 more people expected here

The £694 million investment in Cambridgeshire's water infrastructure which has been approved is part of Anglian Water's £11 billion plan for the region that will be implemented between 2025 and 2030. It was approved by water industry regulator, Ofwat, and the plan aims to create jobs, protect the environment, and support the rapidly growing local economy. The East of England is the fastest growing region in the country, with approximately 700,000 more people expected to live there in the next 20 years.
