A warning for savers

It was reported in the Cambs News that an elderly widow has been left penniless after Huntingdonshire District Council stripped her of her £28,000 nest egg - because she had saved too much.

Mary Morley, 86, regularly saved a little bit of her £149.54 State Pension every week after she retired at the age of 65 in 1989. The former chambermaid fell victim to a scandal which can see elderly people on low incomes stripped of their nest eggs by councils fed information from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP).

Because she had unwittingly saved more than the £16,000 allowed by people claiming housing benefit - the council are now taking it back from her.

Mary, who has carers twice a day, has been taken to court for inadvertently crossing the savings limit for claiming Housing Benefit and Council Tax Support.

What to do with the money?

The Hunts Post reported this week that Huntingdonshire District Council has accumulated a £15million pile of cash from development charges but has forked out just £3million on a road project it is involved in.

Councillor Ryan Fuller stated that Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money, paid by developers to help offset the impact their schemes can have, had only just started to be paid in larger amounts as a number of big developments started to trigger payments but he vowed that communities which bore the brunt of development will share in the cash when it is distributed.

The council has calculated that it could receive up to £108 million in CIL money during its local plan period, which runs until 2036. So far councillors have approved the spending of just over £3million on the Edison Bell Way link road, which it was involved in providing with Cambridgeshire County Council, to open up an under-used industrial area and reduce traffic pressure on the ring road.

Some Good News


HDC has approved the construction of St Ives Town FC's new football pitches of land at Hillside View, Somersham Road, as well as giving outline permission for a clubhouse. Development of the old pitch by St Ivo School for housing has still to go ahead.

Policing numbers in the county have risen after 28 recruits joined the constabulary on

July 3 bringing the total of new officers joining the force since November to 124.

The St Ivo Academy pupil Joe Purbrick is celebrating English Schools' Championships medal success for the second successive year with a silver in the intermediate boys' hurdles. Joe, who is also a highly-rated footballer, clocked a personal best of 13.11, a mark that lifts him to third in the national Under 17 Men rankings despite still only being 15.

Heidi - about Bats again

Would Heidi leave you hanging? No way my lovelies. (Riverporter 38 article Storm in a tree cup.) It appears that the last-minute Town Council bat survey for our beloved yet condemned Horse Chestnut tree in Warner's Park included an 'aerial' inspection. This revealed no crevices suitable for roosting. No bat activity was therefore concluded and so sentence was carried out with no special measures. However, bat boxes were installed in neighbouring trees - we know that the two neighbouring Walnuts do show very suitable crevices so we have to wonder why the boxes were felt needed? You can't pacify Heidi that easily! No matter, any bats still around now have plenty of choice.

Routine Council tree surveys apparently do not include bat surveys - now this seems short-sighted and our Council would be well advised to reconsider this. It would save money (compared to retrospective surveys), allow the Council to plan and manage maintenance in respect of bats' status in law, and allow it to keep the public properly informed in a similar situation.

Finally, the Council said no further statements will be issued. This might be considered insensitive given the number of people who were genuinely concerned. But, rest assured, your Riverporter will remain as vigilant as ever over such matters and work hard to find out the information you deserve to know.

Part of Busway closed all summer

Due to the ongoing A14 roadworks the bus service will be unable to reach a number of the usual stops due to the roadworks in the area on the A14 being carried out, a longer diversion route will be in place throughout the planned period.


The map below issued by Stagecoach shows the affected areas...

Travelling towards Cambridge

Busway Route A/D will leave the track at Histon (turning right onto Cambridge Road) and through Orchard Park to CRC where it will re-join its normal route. Passengers are able to board and alight at the stops just outside the Mace Shop and at CRC.

Busway Route B will leave the track at Histon (turning right onto Cambridge Road) and will continue along Histon Road. Passengers are able to board and alight at the stops just outside the Mace Shop and at stops just South of King's Hedges Road. Passengers intending to board at Orchard Park are advised to use stops on the opposite side of the road and board Busway A.

Travelling towards St Ives

Busway Route A/D will serve its normal route up to CRC. After serving this stop, it will then travel through Orchard Park before turning onto Histon Road/Cambridge Road. The route will join the track at Histon (turning left at the Mace Shop). Passengers are able to board and alight at the Histon Busway stop and at CRC as usual.

Busway Route B will travel along Histon Road, serving stops just South of King's Hedges Road. It will continue its normal route along Cambridge Road, and will re-join the track at Histon. Passengers are able to board at the Histon Busway Stop and at stops just South of King's Hedges Road. Passengers intending to board at Orchard Park are advised to use stops on the opposite side of the road and board Busway A services.



Neighbourhood watch welcome the latest policing update

The past week saw a report to a town centre neighbourhood watch team, relating to the recent series of anti-social behaviour occurrences in the town centre. Sgt. Draper informed the group that efforts to clamp down on these problems and report all occurrences is having an effect and police are now better informed with a flow of evidence of when and where these issues occur, which will lead to police action when appropriate.

Holiday Season means nothing to report

July's Town Council meeting was probably the shortest ever, lasting just 28 minutes. Mayor Dan had decided that councillors needn't wear their heavy robes, due to the heat, and the subsequent discussion on the merits of this decision lasted longer than any other item on the agenda. Colin Saunderson returned to speak in the public participation section as the draft minutes showed he was in favour of the controversial motion C46 (asking the Corn Exchange to provide details of the last four years booking charges - see *The Riverporter* 37) rather than totally against it. *The Riverporter* noted the minutes have now been amended.

Mayor Dan did announce his concern at the low attendance of councillors at Civic events and went on to comment on speaking to the press saying: 'If we (councillors) talk to the media we do it ONLY as a corporate body. Individuals (councillors) do NOT do it off their own back.'

The Riverporter subsequently sought clarification on this comment as it appeared to us that councillors were being dissuaded from talking to us, an issue we had been discussing with the previous Mayor. The confusion arises because Town (or Parish) councillors are part of a corporate body and therefore cannot speak on behalf of the Council unless authorised to do so. This means that they cannot talk as a councillor but as an individual, which implies that outside the council chamber they are not councillors?! Confusing or what! Anyway the Town Clerk confirmed that councillors can speak to the press as long as they do so as individuals. There were no reports from the Police, District Councillors or from the County Councillor, in fact very little was discussed. With no meeting in August there will be no news until September!
