'Eat out to help out' off to a flying start



A lot of St Ives restaurants has joined up for the Government's scheme to help our beleaguered restaurants kick start their businesses.

The idea is quite simple....If you eat out in any participating restaurant each person will get a 50% discount up to a value of £10 per person. So if two people eat out and your bill comes to £50 you would only pay £30 or if your bill only came to £25 you would only pay £12.50. The restaurant gets the rest direct from the Government.

Dine as many times as you like ...

The scheme runs throughout August but only on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays. However you can dine as many times as you want on those days - breakfast, lunch, afternoon tea and dinner.

The offer only applies to eating out and does not apply to takeaways and it does not include alcohol, but soft drinks are covered. So let's get out there and have some fun, and ask yourself when was the last time the Government bought you lunch?

Important information from St Ives Town Council ST IVES COVID-19 COMMUNITY SUPPORT HUB

Since April the Community Hub has been operating to assist residents of the town.

We have circulated three separate information booklets to all households over that period. The last two booklets had a 'Red Hand' symbol on the back cover for those in need of assistance, who were unable to contact the Hub directly, to display in their windows. A network of Street Wardens also voluntarily patrolled their neighbourhood areas specifically to look for the Red Hands.

Very fortunately, this service was only required on a limited number of occasions. Since the gradual releasing of lock down, requests for assistance generally have greatly diminished. It has been decided, therefore, to cease the Red Hands alerting system. We plan to keep open the Hub Helpline for the rest of the year and possibly longer dependant upon local need.

Friends of Holt Island

The Friends have announced that their new Chairman is former Town Mayor Daniel Rowe.

The group thanked Helen Whatnell for the years she spent in steering the Friends successfully and effectively.

Unhappy 6th anniversary for historically important building



When an application for a bar licence for the Octagon building by the bus station went to HDC in 2014, many feared the worst. After a campaign by Save the Octagon money was raised to restore the building for community benefit, however local District Councillors reneged on a deal in 2016 and despite £50,000 of taxpayers money being spent on it, it remains a store for bins (see recent picture, left). Other requests by established businesses, to use the building deemed surplus to requirements by the HDC in 2014, have also been thwarted and there is no mention of how the building will be used in the latest Masterplan for St Ives.

WOT NO BINS?



Covid 19 precautions, and the removal of some rubbish bins, has created more space for St Ives visitors to view the Town Team's Riverport information panel!

A couple of issues ago we reported that areas of the town were to receive new, larger rubbish bins from HDC, that would help recycle our street rubbish, but they have so far failed to appear.

We checked with our hard working Town Clerk who admitted she was as mystified as us why they had not been installed, so we called HDC's and asked them why the new bins still are missing after nearly four weeks. A very helpful person in their Press Department admitted they had no idea but said they would find out and get back to us. Alas two days later we have heard nothing.

However, in the meantime we have noticed that several of the town centre's existing bins have disappeared ... But helpful residents now leave their rubbish in the ex-bins' location (just for old time sake no doubt! - see below).




HEIDI EXPLAINS ANATOMY

‘There’s Safety in Neighbours!’

Neighbourhood Watch has launched a new campaign aimed to help us keep our homes and neighbourhoods safe now that lockdown is easing and there are more people out and about again. The campaign is called ‘Safety in Neighbours’ and provides practical tools and advice to combat burglary. The idea is that life is safer when you know your neighbours – with more people looking out for unusual behaviour on our streets, burglaries can be prevented.

More worrying news for dog owners

The Riverporter has been made aware of police reports from several other regional and national newspapers of a very worrying rise in people stealing dogs. Papers are carrying stories of house break-ins and even break-ins at dog kennels and large numbers of dogs being stolen. In some areas of the country people have been confronted in the streets with threats of violence if they don't hand over their dog.

Local thefts reported to police include:

Two cocker spaniels were stolen on May 3 from Bluntisham. They were found and returned to their rightful owners following a warrant in Willingham on June 5. Nine dogs were stolen from Horningsea with one being found close by shortly afterwards on June 11. One cocker spaniel was stolen from Wilburton on June 23 and there was an attempted theft in Haddenham on July 3.

Police advise that if you are offered a dog or puppy from anyone that you suspect may not be legitimate please report it... The theft of a loved family pet can be totally heart breaking but if we all remain vigilant we can help stop this heartless crime.

Latest News

A recent report that chalk marks in the street possibly indicate that a dog lives there, is not true according to the police who are taking the matter very seriously.

Report a stolen dog

If your dog is stolen then it's vital to report it to police by calling 101, but owners should also consider: Reporting the theft to your local authority dog warden and notify your microchip database provider.

Reporting the theft to www.doglost.co.uk or their Facebook page as they co-ordinate thefts for each county and offer advice and support.
