Council plan for a new normal

As the second stage in the Government's Roadmap is reached, with the opening of pub gardens, hairdressers and public buildings there is some optimism that things will return to normal before too long.

However some of the events we have each year may not take place for some time and those that will resume could look different.

Last Wednesday's Town Council meeting discussed the date for the annual Mayor Making and councillors agreed that it would be on-line one again. The meeting, to confirm the Mayor and Deputy for the next twelve months, will take place on Wednesday 5th May, the day before local elections.

Councillors also agreed the re-opening of the Town Hall, which will happen from 19 April, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays only from 10am to 4pm. This may remain the times for the future should a six month review prove satisfactory.

Previously the Town Hall was open from 9am Monday to Friday but the experience of the last year suggests that there has been no reduction in the level of service with staff working remotely.

Government advice is to continue to work from home where possible and Council staff reported that remote

working has had a beneficial effect on their mental health and work life balance. The Town Clerk, in her report to councillors, also states that there is a saving in fuel as staff travel less often to the office, reducing the Council's carbon emissions.

Further discussions about council meetings decided that they should remain virtual for the time being.

The current Mayor, Councillor Jonathan Pallant has certainly had a year to remember. Being elected Mayor is usually the highlight of a councillor's career. Being the 'voice' and leader of the Town Council is not only an honour but often a life changing experience.

This is largely because the role involves engagements with many groups, clubs, other authorities and people one doesn't usually meet. Most Mayors say that their year in the job really makes them aware of the whole community.

In Jonathan's case he has hardly had an engagement to attend in person but he did say he had still enjoyed the virtual civic engagements and

had found them enlightening. Mayor Pallant has had to deal with a number of unusual issues. It started even before he was 'crowned' as some members tried to put an alternative councillor forward for Mayor on the grounds that lockdown required a more experienced person. This 'coup' failed and fortunately Jonathan showed that his IT skills were essential as meetings became totally on-line.

Wednesday's zoom meeting began with prayers and an opportunity for councillors to share their memories of Cllr Davies, who was buried on 8th April. This was followed by a two minute silence in honour of him.

Co-option confirmed

The Town Clerk confirmed that the vacant seat of former Cllr Wilson will be filled by co-option. The Council will have to wait until Monday to hear if Cllr Davies' seat will also go to co-option. If it does then applicants will have until **29th April** to apply to join the Council. The successful applicants will be chosen by existing councillors.

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THE NEW BRIDGES CAUSEWAY

Our history correspondent Daniel Wiseman looks at the history of the 'New Bridges', which will be 200 years old next year.

The New Bridges Causeway carries London Road over the flood plain meadows south of the Great Ouse and was the main route into St Ives for centuries, until the opening of the bypass in 1980. The building of the causeway began in April 1822 and was completed in less than six months. Construction required 1.25 million bricks, all cut from local clay and fired in kilns at The How brickworks (now the country park between One Leisure and The Thicket). These were then loaded onto barges known as 'lighters' and floated down to the wharf by The Dolphin. (The remains of one of the last lighters is apparently buried in Nobles Field, between The Thicket and the river.)

The causeway was owned by the Duke of Manchester and one of the bricks still carries the signature of John Turner, the master builder of the 200-metre (700 ft) causeway, as we mentioned in RP82). Only 25 years after construction was completed, the bridge was modified to install a level-crossing for the new St Ives to Huntingdon railway. You can easily spot where the railway once was because when the crossing was removed and the contractors used red bricks instead, which did not match the yellow bricks on the rest of the causeway.

Until the 1980s, a tollbooth stood between the chapel bridge and the causeway, where travellers once paid to cross the new bridge.

Today the importance of the 55-arch bridge is recognised by its grade II* listed status, which is the same category as Battersea Power Station - more important than a plain grade II listing but not as important as grade I. This means it cannot be demolished and the upcoming repairs need to be carefully regulated to protect its unique character!

FINDING YOUR OUSE VALLEY WAY!

Back in January the Great Ouse Valley Trust received funding from the County Council to provide the Ouse Valley Way with some 'tender loving care'.

The Ouse Valley Way is one of the longest river valley walks (approximately 150 miles) in the country. It runs through Northamptonshire, Buckinghamshire, Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Norfolk.

The Mayor of St Neots, Cllr Stephen Ferguson, recently walked its entire length, mostly in the pouring rain, to raise funds for his charities (his blistered feet ended up featured on Facebook). There is another complete walk being planned for this August

by Celia Woolley who will make a Blog of her journey. And the BRJ Run and Tri Club are just itching to stage their Ouse Valley Way Marathon again this year – the section of the path through Cambridgeshire just happens to be 26.2 miles long!

The original information panels were created by HDC when the path was first waymarked in 2004 and they have stood the test of time fairly well. However, the County Council made the decision that, along with better signage and improvements to



the path itself, a fresh look and update for the panels would be the perfect project for funding from Highways England A14 Legacy Fund. And, that the Great Ouse Valley Trust would be the perfect local volunteer group to provide the panels.

Ian Jackson of the Great Ouse Valley Trust re-wrote the flora and fauna sections with contributions from local experts. Working with the original designer-illustrator Coral Walton, of Coral Design and printers, Create Signs, the boards have been updated and new ones added including one to be installed on The Waits paid for by the Town Council

Special warning to St Ives residents



Residents blamed for wanting election

HDC Leader and Town Councillor, Ryan Fuller, in an email sent to councillors, seemed to blame residents in the Broadway and The Quay for seeking to elect a new town councillor rather than letting him and other councillors choose one, following the resignation of Brian Luter last May. His recent comment has angered some of those residents who quite properly sought to have an election. One resident told *The Riverporter* that they sought the election to ensure that the make up of the council was chosen by voters rather than by councillors, who might choose friends or colleagues. The situation was further complicated by the fact that Covid had postponed the election for a year, and despite there only being one candidate, who was elected unopposed, they were pleased that the new councillor is someone new to the town and represents the Green Party, the first such councillor on St Ives Town Council.

We're running out of councillors!

Well sort of... it certainly has been an interesting year for our current Mayor Jonathan Pallant. If it's not the pandemic and the stress of holding a council meeting via the infernal Zoom, then it's an unprecedented number of councillor resignations, which may have caused other problems...



Berman Park opens

The new park on the old golf course has been officially named Berman Park after residents overwhelmingly chose the name of the popular local couple Henry and Joan Berman (pictured).

There has been much praise on-line for the name and the park however not everyone is happy and a local professional with over 30 years experience as a parks & gardens manager was unimpressed, saying he was gobsmacked that a path through a field of mud was ready for visitors. He suggested that the opening was premature and looked like a piece of electioneering and the state of the dried mud could even be a danger for children.

HDC leader Cllr Ryan Fuller, who at a Town Meeting in March 2019 said that he considered securing the land for the park his proudest

achievement said 'We cannot wait to welcome residents to the park at a time when our open spaces have never been more valued.' *The Riverporter* spoke with one of the workmen there who has said that the ground needs another two machine treatments before it can be sowed and it could do with a bit of rain first. We also noted that the work had exposed a lot of fossils from the Triassic and Jurassic period showing that Berman park was once a sea bed.
