Neighbourhood Plan Team to hold consultation

So let's start with some good news. The St Ives Neighbourhood Plan Team will be holding their first consultation during July. There will be exhibitions at:

- Burleigh Hill Community Centre on Friday 16th July from 14.00 to 17.00
- Farmers Market on Saturday 17th July

There will also be limited number of paper copies available from the Town Hall.

An opportunity to shape the future

This is an opportunity to shape the future, with respect to new development. The displays will cover issues such as new housing, the town centre, community facilities and green space.

Neighbourhood Plan Team Chair Nick Dibben said: 'The Neighbourhood Plan team feel that the town has reached a natural limit so we are



not proposing any expansion of the town, but we would like people to confirm that this is what they want.

'With respect to the town centre, we are aware that the Combined Authority Mayor and HDC are developing ideas so we will need to coordinate with them on that, but the Neighbourhood Plan can help define the scope of these changes.

'One of the ideas we want to develop is a 'green ring' around the town. This may take many years to put into place but would provide natural corridors for wildlife and possible routes for walkers to enjoy the countryside.

'We would like to know what the public think and their responses will help shape the final plan.'

According to Civil Engineer Peter Townsend, recent St Ives Town Council Planning Committee meetings have been unlawful.

In a formal complaint made to the Council, Mr Townsend states that they failed to hold their meetings in public, which a high court judgement stipulated had to be done from 7 May.

This resulted in a 'closed shop' where councillors comments and decisions were made behind closed doors. This view was confirmed by CAPALC, the Association for Local Councils, who told the Town Clerk that 'the Council were not being open and transparent' as members of the public were unable to listen to the debate or participate.



Can you help locate relatives of these St Ives Students?

The Riverporter was contacted by ex-councillor and BHF fundraiser Jean Chandler, who would like to contact relatives of some St Ives schoolchildren who attended school in the late 1890s.

This is quite an unusual story, which has thrown a light on education for St Ives children in Victorian times. Jean, who is a bit of a hoarder, was sorting out things, as you often do, and came across some books that she had found nearly 50 years ago in the loft of the old North Road school (see pic top right).

Jean had run a playgroup in the building prior to it being demolished and had found a sack containing old school books.

BOOKS REVEAL WHAT VICTORIAN EDUCATION WAS LIKE

They show just how hard teachers and pupils had to work in the 1890's in St Ives. A long school day, a wide range of subjects, monthly tests and written reports for pupils and the teachers were normal.

Studying the books that Jean has collected has thrown a light on what boys in Class 3 of Boys Board School St Ives were taught in 1897/8.

The handwriting exercise books required the student to copy a pre-printed text. This text also helped educate the student as it contained information as per the sample right, which mentioned Cromwell.

The weekly timetable (right) shows that subjects taught were:

Reading - 3 hours 55 minutes

Arithmetic - 5 hours 15 minutes

Spelling & Dictation - 2 hrs 45 mins

Writing - 1 hour 10 minutes

Geography - 1 hour 45 minutes

History - 2 hours 20 minutes

Drawing/Needlework - 2 hours


Recreation (PE?) - 2 hours 5 minutes

Mapping - 1 hour 10 minutes


Composition - 35 minutes

Singing - 30 minutes

General (studies?) - 35 minutes.



One of the most interesting features of the timetable is the range of subjects, which did not include any foreign languages. In total students were taught for just over 24 hours a week beginning just after 9am and finishing at 4.20pm with an hour break at lunchtime.



The Syllabus Report & Examination Register, (below), detailed the results of monthly tests and the teacher, F. Allen had to write a report of the syllabus covered each term, which the headteacher, a J. Hazlett, passed judgement on.



Do you know anyone who might be a descendent of the following students?

David Hodge, Ernest Parfitt, Herbert Searle, Percy Brooks, Leonard Moor and Percy Kirby.

They all attended the Boys Board School in St Ives in 1898.

A Plastic Free July?

The Refill Shop of Ikgai in St Ives, is encouraging everyone to take part in this year's Plastic Free July challenge, by sharing ideas, tips and easy ways people in St Ives and the local area can reduce their single use plastic consumption.

The campaign, which started on Thursday 1 July, is part of a global initiative from the PlasticFreeJuly.org, who have a vision of seeing a world free of plastic waste. From swapping toothpaste tubes to jars, plastic bags of food to reusable containers refilled and plastic sticky tape to paper tape, there are a lot of easy ways to reduce plastic consumption. Each day there will be simple swaps and ideas on the shop's social media sites, that people can easily make, and people are encouraged to share their tips and alternatives to plastic too.

Martin Cooper, owner of The Refill Shop of Ikgai, said: 'We can't all expect to stop using plastic overnight, but if everyone just makes one change, it all contributes to the global problem of plastic waste. While it may not seem a lot, every little change will have an impact and may become a new habit for people. I hope our plastic alternative suggestions will help everyone see how easy it can be and inspire everyone to think about ways in which they can take up the Plastic Free July challenge and reduce plastic waste for good.'



Ongoing surgery work

The build at the Cromwell Place branch of the Grove Medical Practice is rather like Peyton Place: it never seems to end. Due for completion in late autumn 2020, the build is continuing. When asked, the Surgery couldn't provide any sort of date. Instead, it blamed materials. In the meantime, for the last 6 months there have been escalating problems as the parking promised as part of planning permissions was blocked by metal barriers, and the 'short-term' use of the rear entrance rather than the normal entrance on Cromwell Place.



That led to patients parking along the rear, blocking garages and neighbours' drives. Installing cones and plastic barriers did little to ease the problem - with patients regularly driving inside them on the pavement, and running over both cones and barriers. With nowhere to park, deliveries have commonly blocked the road, worsening traffic problems. Hopefully, completion at some stage will close this sorry saga.

Jason's ammunition finally exposed!

Under the headline:

Former Police and Crime Commissioner Jason Ablewhite will not be prosecuted

The Cambs Times, sister paper to the Hunts Post, disclosed that a police search came across 'a small box containing various size spent and live ammunition' in a locked cabinet. This strange 'News' suddenly emerged, almost 18 months after Mr Ablewhite resigned. It seems that a search of Mr Ablewhite's house in November 2019, during a probe into allegations concerning an email exchange of explicit photos with a 50-year-old woman, discovered the ammunition, which prompted the separate investigation. Mr Ablewhite resigned from his £85,000 a year role in December 2019 when details of his email exchanges became public and the second 'unrelated' investigation has only now surfaced. The IPCC says that evidence about his possession of live ammunition was passed to the Crown Prosecution Service, whose report says the CPS has decided 'to take no further action'.

In July 2019, Mr Ablewhite backed a Cambridgeshire police campaign to hand in any unlicensed firearms and ammunition as part of a two-week campaign. He said at the time *'As part of wider crime prevention and reduction initiatives, this firearms surrender campaign can only help make the county safer and continue to keep this type of crime low.'*

Some people have queried why, after both investigations, the CPS declined to prosecute the ex Police & Crime Commissioner for incidents that would often result in criminal charges? Curiously there is no mention of this latest development in the Hunts Post.




Just after 11am on Wednesday morning the windows rattled as a formation of RAF Puma helicopters staged a flypast over St Ives. Along the Quayside people stopped and stared as the amazing scene passed over to the south of our town. It turns out that the flypast was part of a formation of RAF Puma helicopters marking 50 years of service in the Royal Air Force. Up to 10 helicopters will fly over a long list of national locations that have all been important to the Puma Force for the last half a century which includes our Wyton base. The first Puma helicopters were delivered into service in 1971 and have been used in a number of conflicts including Northern Ireland and both Gulf Wars. An RAF spokesman said that people are encouraged to share their images using the hashtag #Puma50 to help commemorate this event.

Man banned from St Ives streets



A 29 year old man named as Shane Arthur has been banned from entering St Ives town centre for five years. He received the ban from Peterborough Magistrates Court on June 24th under what is called a Criminal behaviour order or CBO. He is allowed to enter the town for what is described as legitimate activity, but he must then leave immediately. During the court hearing Mr Arthur pleaded guilty to being drunk and disorderly and using threatening or abusive words or behaviour in St Ives. Sergeant Alice Draper spoke with the Hunts Post saying... 'We have successfully secured a CBO prohibiting Arthur from behaving in an anti-social manner. The order was granted after a series of incidents including criminal damage, being drunk and disorderly and threatening and intimidating behaviour and disturbances caused by Arthur.'

Landlords now have more than 2,709 mortgage products to choose from, surpassing the number on the market before the pandemic took hold, Moneyfacts.co.uk data shows. Mortgage rates in July 2021 are also cheaper than the equivalent in 2019, though they've yet to fall to 2020 levels. Landlords wanting a 5-year fix this month can typically get one at 3.01%, far cheaper than the average of 3.50% in 2019. There's also a minor reduction to 2-year fixes, which cost 2.98% compared to 3.01% in July 2019. However mortgage rates were still cheaper in July 2020, when they averaged at 2.61% for a 2-year fix and 2.97% for a 5-year fix.

Eleanor Williams, finance expert at Moneyfacts.co.uk, said: 'Landlords now have the highest level of product choice that we have recorded in over a year.' At 2,709 the number of products available to investors is far more than the choice they were faced with this time last year, but perhaps even more interesting is that there are 365 deals more available now than we recorded in July 2019, demonstrating the strength and resilience of this sector in the aftermath of an unprecedented 18-months.

'The demand for buy-to-let could well remain strong in the months to come as rental demand is prevalent, indicated by recent research from Propertymark's Private Rented Sector report, May saw a record-breaking number of new prospective tenants registered.'

'Whether now is the right time to invest in property may also come down to the desire to earn a decent income. Indeed, research from Nottingham Building Society revealed that 61% of landlords surveyed felt property was a better investment due to low interest rates for savings – and this coupled with high demand for rental accommodation could sway new investors to dive into the buy-to-let sector.'

The past few months has seen mainstream lenders like The Mortgage Works return to 80% loan-to-value lending. Rates in that bracket now typically stand at 3.94% for a 2-year fix and 4.15% for a 5-year fix. However things get much cheaper at 75% LTV, where you can typically get a 2-year fix at 3.01% and a 5-year fix at 3.36%.

Williams added: 'There could still be some understandable hesitation from prospective landlords with some existing investors who could even be considering downsizing their portfolio depending on the pandemic's impact. However, we are beginning to see some improvements in average rates in certain loan-to-value brackets on a month-on-month basis. As house prices rise, demand for rental accommodation is high, and savings rates remain poor, therefore, investing in property could be enticing to some. It is vital though that would-be landlords and those looking to change their deal seek advice to ensure it's the right time for them and they find the best package for their circumstances and plans.'
